Dear Parents,

As we near the end of Term 3 can I thank everybody for their hard work and support since we returned from the Christmas holidays. The term has flown by and as the Six Nations rugby is about to begin, spring must be just around the corner, so please check the diary dates for a busy Term 4.

Blue Kite Academy Trust Update

Our application and consultations have now been completed in preparation for the Advisory Board in February. The Regional Director will make a decision at the Advisory Board as to whether or not to approve the project and therefore whether or not to issue an Academy Order. It is expected that academy conversions conclude within 3-5 months of approval by the Regional Director.

New Assessment for Years 1-6

We continue to assess pupils based on progress towards and within age related expectations, objectives and skills. Our new report card for 2023/24 (which you will receive next Friday) is based on teacher judgements for specific objectives which have been taught in Reading, Writing, Maths and Science since September. Further explanation will be given on the report card.

Residentials

In March, Year 4 are off to the PGL centre at Liddington on a two-night residential. Preparations for Year 6 going to France in June are also well underway. When I speak to former pupils and parents our Wanborough residentials are remembered very fondly. For the last four Year 6 French trips we have been able to subsidise the cost through our successful Erasmus Projects, where we received funding from the European Union.

Post Brexit the UK government have introduced the Turing scheme' which we applied for last year. Fortunately, we were one of the few schools in the South-West to be awarded a grant which subsides our whole trip for 2024. Moving forwards, we will apply again for 2025 Turing funding (in Term 4), with the results being received before the end of the academic year. However, as this funding can't be guaranteed we will be consulting in the Spring with all stakeholders on the options we can take to provide a super residential experience for our future Year 6 cohorts.

At school, for our LEGO® club, we have carefully selected the children that we think will get the most from it. Your child's class teacher will be in touch if your child has been selected to partake.








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World Book Day - 7th March

Guidance on measles outbreaks

There have been recent localised outbreaks of measles centred around the West Midlands. There is a risk of further outbreaks in other areas unless urgent action is taken to increase Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccination take up in areas with low MMR vaccine rates.

Measles spreads very easily among those who are unvaccinated, especially in nurseries and schools. The best protection against measles for children and adults is to get both doses of the MMR vaccine. It is never too late to have these vaccinations.

DfE has published an <u>Education Hub blog</u> with guidance on measles and the MMR vaccine for parents, nurseries and schools.



- measles outbreaks happen when not enough children have been vaccinated
- measles can be a very serious disease, leading to ear and chest infections, fits, diarrhoea, and damage to the brain.
 Measles can kill
- your child is at risk of measles if he or she hasn't had the MMR vaccination
- 2 doses of MMR vaccine are needed to get the best protection
- if your child is due to have had 2 doses of MMR but has not yet received them, no matter what age they are, you should contact your GP to get them vaccinated as soon as possible*
- if you can't remember if your child has had any, 1 or 2 doses of MMR vaccine, check his or her personal child health record (the Red Book). If this doesn't help, speak to your GP
- if you don't know how many doses your child has had, it's better to have 2 doses of MMR vaccine now rather than risk leaving them unprotected

Answers to some common questions about measles and the MMR vaccine

Why are we seeing these outbreaks of measles?

Measles is a highly infectious disease, spreading quickly from person to person, especially in schools. A child with measles will infect almost all unprotected children they have contact with. Since the end of 2017 there has been an increase in measles globally which has affected the UK. This has resulted in some spread into wider communities, in particular in undervaccinated groups.

When are the MMR vaccinations usually given?

The best times are between 12 and 13 months of age and again at 3 years and 4 months, with one dose on each occasion. But, if your child wasn't vaccinated then, they can be vaccinated at any age with 2 doses one month apart.

Will there be any side effects to the vaccination?

Your child may get the symptoms of measles, mumps and rubella for up to 6 weeks after the vaccination but in a very much milder form. This proves that the vaccine is working and your child is building up resistance to future contact with the viruses that cause the 3 diseases. Not all children show these symptoms but that doesn't mean the vaccine isn't working.

Should parents in outbreak areas get vaccinated against measles?

As with many diseases, once you have had measles, you don't catch it again because you have built up a natural resistance to it. So, if you've had measles or 2 doses of MMR vaccine you do not need to get vaccinated now.


